History Highlights

1958

Waco native Mr. R. B. Parrott and his wife, Edith Heinze Parrott, initiated the idea of establishing the Waco Perpetual Growth Foundation with a \$30,000 gift.

1974

Mr. Parrott died in 1962, and upon Mrs. Parrott's death in 1974, the Foundation received an additional \$311,000.

1994

Stephen Goldstein left \$14 million to Waco Foundation (as it had become known).

1995

MAC Scholarship Program began with Malcolm and Mary Ruth Duncan's wish to establish a scholarship fund that gives every McLennan County graduate the opportunity to attend college.

2001

The Community Grant Writer Program (now the Capacity Building Program) was created to assist local nonprofit organizations in more effectively fulfilling their missions.

2007

Lyle Kay Masterson named Waco Foundation as the income beneficiary of a \$6.5 million charitable remainder unitrust to create a fund in memory of her mother Lyle Seley Masterson.

2008

Waco Foundation is awarded National Standards Seal from Council on Foundations.

We continued providing leadership in the community by increasing collaborations with others to meet local needs. We actively supported the Greater Waco Community Education Alliance with manpower and funds. This data will assist us in facilitating discussions on how nonprofit organizations can impact this area.

In closing, we would like to extend our appreciation to Louie Englander who completed a ten-year term on the Foundation's Board. Louie served with dedication, compassion and wisdom. We have already seen our newest board member, Betty Bauer, exhibit the same characteristics; her willingness to serve is much appreciated. In staff changes, Tihara Vargas, Director of Special Projects, left and Melissa Hardage accepted the newly created position of Coordinator of Outreach and Communications. Cheryl Allen is now Special Projects Consultant working on various Foundation projects and activities.

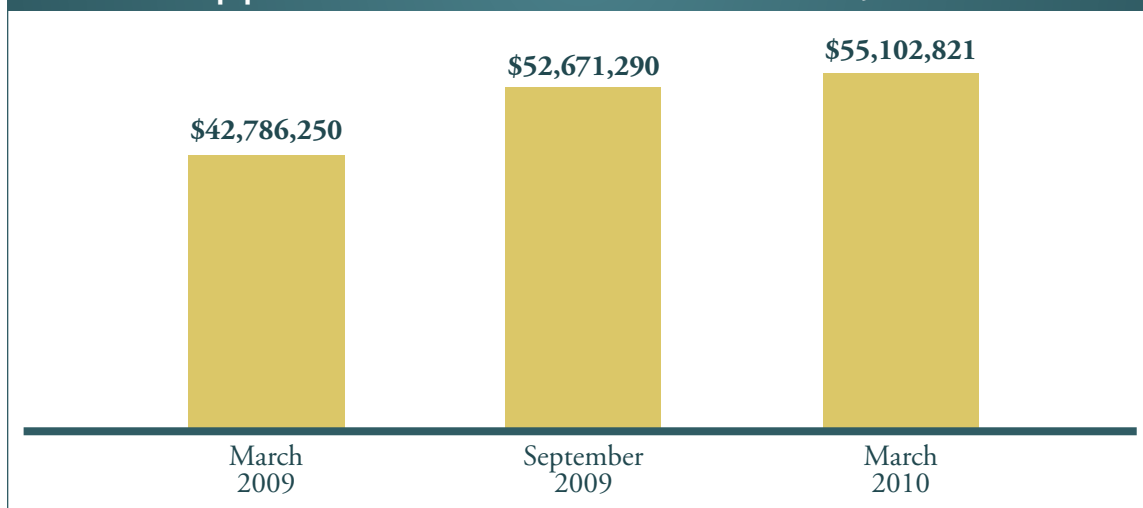


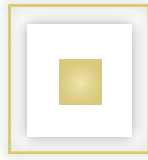

Conference Motivates and Educates

For over twenty years, Youth Connection has facilitated the development of self worth, educational attainment and strong personal character in local youth. Services include providing guidance to teen parents and conducting programs that teaches adolescent students to make positive choices. For fourteen years, they have hosted an annual conference for youth services professionals; an event annually attended by over 150 participants. Waco Foundation has funded speakers several times, most recently in April 2010 when Dr. Beverly O. Ford spoke on empowering youth for change without encouraging dependence.

MAC Scholarship

Each year, the MAC Scholarship Program helps students accomplish their dreams of pursuing higher education by providing tuition assistance to graduates of McLennan County high schools. The vision for the program began with Malcolm and Mary Ruth Duncan's wish to establish an innovative scholarship fund that would give every local student the opportunity to attend college, despite their financial status. As the success of the program became apparent, the Duncans were joined by other educational proponents such as Mr. and Mrs. Clifton Robinson, Mr. and Mrs. Paul J. Meyer and Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Rapoport.

To be eligible for the program, students must apply their senior year in high school and have a family income of \$50,000 or less. Students attending McLennan Community College or Texas State Technical College may receive tuition assistance all four years of college; individuals not attending those schools are eligible to receive scholarships only for the final two years of college.

Since its inception, the program has provided \$3,838,903 in tuition assistance and has helped numerous students complete the FAFSA, an endeavor that resulted in more than \$30 million in state and federal funding awarded locally.

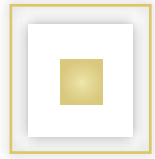

MAC Scholarship

Upon completion of the first two years of college, Baylor University presents the two MAC Scholarship Program participants with the highest GPA (that wish to attend Baylor) with scholarships that pay full tuition for the third and fourth year. Since the partnership began in 1998, Baylor has awarded 26 students with scholarships.

Josh and Jordan Finstad, 2007 and 2009 recipients, are from a family that values education. Their mother Carolyn, a long time elementary school teacher, was recognized as one of Waco Foundation's WISD Outstanding Teachers. With encouragement from their parents, both young men graduated from Midway High School and attended McLennan Community College for two years before transferring to Baylor. Jordan, an Eagle Scout, is currently earning a Bachelors Degree in Business Administration with a focus on Finance. Each semester he has made the Dean's List and is a member of the honor society Phi Theta Kappa. After graduating, he plans to attend law school. Josh recently graduated Magna Cum Laude from Baylor's Hankamer School of Business, and plans to seek a Masters in Business. As a member of Beta Gamma Sigma – the highest renowned academic achievement society in the study of business – he was the only Baylor student (out of eighty participants worldwide) chosen to attend the Student Leadership Forum in 2009.

Capacity Building

Waco Foundation offers support to McLennan County nonprofits through our Capacity Building Program. The program is designed to provide funding and resources for investments in the internal functioning of nonprofits; investments that leverage the contributions of others by enhancing the agency's organizational efficiency and effectiveness.

In 2009 the Capacity Building Program provided:

- Annual HUD SuperNOFA application grantwriting for the Homeless Coalition which resulted in \$570,292 of federal funds for member agencies.
- National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) Waco access to a two year grant for \$80,000 to build a curriculum for community organizations providing treatment for post traumatic stress disorder among veterans.
- \$25,000 from OneStar Foundation for after school service providers to forge stronger, more effective collaborations with designated community partners, including schools and local government offices.
- Monthly workshops at the Waco-McLennan County library to over 120 participants.
- Monthly E-newsletters to over 250 nonprofit organizations
- Four financial nonprofit management classes
- Building Collaborative
- Two Leaders Circles
- Specialized consultants for board training, strategic planning and other services to nonprofits.
- Feedback on grant applications

Effective Boards of Directors Lead to Successful Organizations

Board training provides the executive director and board of directors the knowledge and understanding to effectively carry out their critical role in the organization.

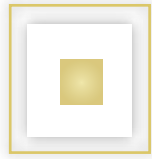

Early Childhood

In 2009 the Waco Foundation commissioned the Texas Early Childhood Education Coalition (TECEC) to develop an Early Childhood Quality of Life Index (QLI) to determine the range of needs by designated risk factor and geographic location within McLennan County. The report serves as a baseline of information that will help local health care, education and child care institutions plan for the future.

The study revealed a number of striking findings:

- McLennan County has an overall quality of life score of 40% out of a 100 point scale, using a weighted ranking of 12 risk factors most closely linked to a child's health and educational development.
- A 57% disparity exists between the lowest and highest county zip codes on the Early Childhood Quality of Life Index (QLI).
- Children develop sensory pathways and language during the first year of life and impairments during this time limit their ability to learn, resulting in educational challenges later in life.
- A high teen pregnancy rate is one of the greatest barriers to quality of life for young children. In 2007, over 400 teens living in the lowest QLI zip codes gave birth. Teen parents have a much higher likelihood of poor prenatal care that leads to low infant birth weights and high infant mortality rates. Should 400 teens continue to get pregnant annually, Waco will struggle to significantly reduce poverty and see better educational outcomes in the future.
- Efforts to improve early childhood quality of life must focus on parents, particularly those expecting and with very young children. McLennan County has 37,757 children below the age of eleven and 12,311 child care slots available (9,683 child care, 953 Head Start and 1,675 Pre-K). Having quality child care, while important, cannot be the only method of care improvement. Because most children are in the care of parents, relatives or friends, it is vital that efforts are focused on communicating a child's educational and developmental needs to this population.

The study also provided encouraging news:

- McLennan County can concentrate its efforts in the zip codes that will result in the most drastic improvements for a child's development and for the community.
- Approximately 300 women in the lowest QOL zip codes do not receive adequate prenatal care. Efforts can be focused on increasing access to quality and affordable prenatal care, which would drastically improve outcomes for young children in these areas.
- The return on investment for early childhood is very high so relatively few resources can be spent to make significant improvements for the community.

Education Alliance



Since its beginning in 1958, Waco Foundation has made education a priority, awarding over three million dollars from unrestricted and designated funds to local nonprofits for educational projects and over four million dollars in MAC scholarships. In 2008, we became more active in the process by joining with others in establishing the Greater Waco Community Education Alliance, a group that seeks to increase educational success in our community.

Support for the Alliance comes from local businesses, organizations and individuals that care about the future of our community. A recently established board of diverse community leaders advises the Alliance. They will help with strategic vision and organizational oversight. Former Mayor Virginia DuPuy began serving in a voluntary capacity as Executive Director. Ashley Weaver is the Project Coordinator and oversees the Best Tutoring Practices Program.

The Third Annual Greater Waco Community Education Alliance Summit will be on November 17-19, 2010.

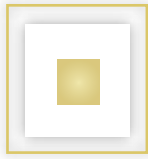

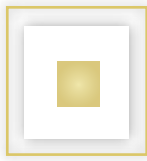
